



Metropolitan Council concludes Fall Session, recommends 19th AAC venue

The [Metropolitan Council](#) of the Orthodox Church in America concluded its [fall session](#) at Immaculate Conception Seminary here on Thursday, September 22, 2016.

The meeting was chaired by His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon. In attendance were His Eminence, Archbishop Benjamin and His Eminence, Archbishop Michael of the Standing Synod and the OCA's Officers—Archpriest John Jillions, Chancellor; Archpriest Eric G. Tosi, Secretary; and Melanie Ringa, Treasurer.

According to Father Eric G. Tosi, the session opened on Tuesday, September 19 with a one-day retreat on Christian Leadership led by Protodeacon Peter Danilchick and Charles Ajalat. Protodeacon Peter shared basic principles of leadership as detailed in his book, *Thy Will Be Done: Strategic Leadership, Planning and Management for Christians*, slated to be released in the near future by [Saint Vladimir's Seminary Press](#). Mr. Ajalat offered practical tips for leadership and initiatives that Christian leaders can fulfill on a local and national level to encourage pan-Orthodox activity, ministry and growth.

In his opening remarks, Metropolitan Tikhon expanded on his vision of the Church for the future, highlighting specific issues of particular interest to members of the Metropolitan Council.

Representatives of the OCA [Pension Board](#) reported on the status of and changes to the Pension Plan, details of which will be made available in the immediate future. Council members also reviewed the work of the Metropolitan Council's committees and the OCA's [departments](#).

Father John Jillions reviewed the work of [ORSMA and SMPAC](#), while Protopresbyter Leonid Kishkovsky presented a report on the work of the [Office of External Affairs](#) and reviewed recent developments in world Orthodoxy. In his report, Father Tosi highlighted recent developments with regard to IT issues, the OCA [Archives](#) and communications.

Other highlights of the session include the following.

- In response to a presentation by Father Tosi on long-range preparations for the 19th All-American Council [AAC], Metropolitan Council members unanimously recommended that the AAC convene at the Union Station Hotel, Saint Louis, MO during the week of July 23-28, 2018. The recommendation will be referred to the [Holy Synod of Bishops](#) for approval at their October 2016 session. Council members further

- recommended that a youth program, held in conjunction with the national convention of the [Fellowship of Orthodox Christians in America](#) [FOCA], once again be organized.
- Melanie Ringa, OCA Treasurer, and members of the Finance Committee reviewed the current status of the 2016 budget and presented the budget for 2017. The budget, which includes six planting grants for 2017, passed unanimously. Positive reports also were presented by the Internal and External Auditors.
Archdeacon Joseph Matusiak presented a report on the work of [Stewards of the Orthodox Church in America](#) [SOCA] and the current [Saint Herman Appeal](#), noting that the SOCA has raised \$43,589.00 to date in 2016. After challenging Metropolitan Council members to fully participate in SOCA's ongoing growth, an additional \$4,960.00—which will be doubled by a matching grant—was raised “from the floor.”
- FOCA national President Marge Kovach and Archpriest Theodore Boback presented a report on the work of FOCA in which they highlighted accomplishments undertaken at its recent annual convention in Chicago.
- The Legal Committee presented a report on current legal issues and challenges.
- A strategic planning session, based on Metropolitan Tikhon's “Four Pillar” initiative unveiled at the [18th All-American Council](#), was held on the session's final day. A series of possible initiatives and action items on the four pillars—developing spiritual life, evangelism and outreach, stewardship and external affairs—was developed by Council members.

On Wednesday, Metropolitan Council members attended the Divine Liturgy celebrated by Metropolitan Tikhon at the Chancery's Saint Sergius of Radonezh Chapel.

The Metropolitan Council is the permanent executive body of the Church Administration which exists for the purpose of implementing the decisions of the [All-American Council](#) and continuing its work between sessions. Members include the Metropolitan, who serves as Chair; the Chancellor, the Secretary, and the Treasurer; one priest and one layperson elected by each diocese; and three priests and an equal number of laypersons elected by the All-American Council.

Experts “rethink” sacred arts at SVOTS symposium

Highly influential global scholars and artists took seriously the task of “Rethinking Sacred Arts” at a weekend symposium at [Saint Vladimir’s Orthodox Theological Seminary](#) here September 16–18, 2016. Participants drew from their respective disciplines and expertise in exploring both historic categories and new ways of thinking about “sacrality” and “art.”

The symposium, which included a public panel discussion on Saturday evening attended by an audience of 75 people, was the first in a series of events planned between fall 2016 and spring 2018 by the seminary, all of which are a part of its Sacred Arts Initiative [SAI] funded by a grant from the Henry Luce Foundation.

Dr. Peter C. Bouteneff, Professor of Systematic Theology at the seminary and SAI Director, coordinated the symposium, along with Deacon Evan Freeman, SVOTS alumnus and Ph.D. candidate in the Department of the History of Art at Yale University; Richard Schneider, Professor of Iconology and Hermeneutics at SVOTS; and Megan Carlisle Rakowski, a trained archivist and seminary alumna.

“In thinking freshly about what it means to call something ‘sacred,’ our symposium participants reflected on the dialogical relationship between God and the human person,” noted Dr. Bouteneff. “It is in the human response to God that we create and partake in objects, spaces, words, and sounds that bring us to the encounter with and praise of God.

“Our symposiasts also spoke appreciatively of the unique contribution that the Orthodox world can offer in reflecting theologically on the material world, on human creativity, and on the coming together of the sacred arts in the context of the Liturgy,” he added. “Their participation in our chapel services made a great impression on them in that regard.”

Among the participants, three were within the Orthodox Christian tradition—sacred music composer Protopresbyter Ivan Moody, Chairman of the International Society for Orthodox Church Music and currently a researcher at CESEM-Universidade Nova de Lisboa; Vasileios Marinis, Associate Professor of Christian Art and Architecture at the Yale Institute of Sacred Music and Divinity School; and George Kordis, iconographer and former Professor in Iconography (Theory and Practice) at the University of Athens.

Other participants represented a wide spectrum of confessional beliefs and disciplines and included Gordon Graham, Henry Luce III Professor of Philosophy and the Arts, Princeton Theological Seminary; Helen C. Evans, Mary and Michael Jaharis Curator for Byzantine Art, the Metropolitan Museum of Art; Annemarie Weyl Carr, University Distinguished Professor of Art History, Southern Methodist University (*Emerita*); Peter Jeffery, Michael P. Grace Chair in Medieval Studies

and Professor of Musicology and Ethnomusicology, Notre Dame University; Margot Fassler, Keough-Hesburgh Professor of Music and Liturgy, University of Notre Dame; Judith Wolfe, Senior Lecturer in Theology and the Arts, University of Saint Andrews, Scotland; and Mary Carruthers, Professor of English, New York University (*Emerita*) and Quondam Fellow of All Souls College, Oxford.

The next SAI event will be an international conference, titled, “Sounding the Sacred,” May 1-4, 2017, which will continue the work of the Arvo Pärt Project at Saint Vladimir’s Seminary.

Orthodox Detroit Outreach initiates 24/7 outdoor food pantry at SS. Peter and Paul Cathedral

Inspired in part by the example of Saint Maria Skobtsova of Paris, the patron saint of Orthodox Detroit Outreach ministries, a 24/7 outdoor food pantry has been established at Saints Peter and Paul Cathedral here as a means of further expending the ministries’ loving service to the parish’s neighbors.

“Each week, flowing from the heavenly Banquet of Sunday Divine Liturgy, our Sunday afternoon neighborhood meal provides a continued celebration of divine love with our neighbors in need,” said Archpriest Paul Albert, cathedral Rector. “Hundreds of volunteers from surrounding Orthodox parishes devote thousands of hours each year, sharing the joy and blessings of our ‘Feast of Faith’ with our neighbors.

“Serving Christ in our neighbors in such a simple, direct and meaningful way each week is for us a ‘school’ of practical, incarnational theology,” added Father Paul. “Through this medium, the Holy Spirit warms our hearts, inspires us, and compels us to fuller measures of service. In this spirit, in seeing the need to extend help beyond our regular ‘hours of operation,’ one of our ministry leaders, Matthew McCroskery, was inspired to build and install the 24/7 outdoor pantry -- which enhances a similar kiosk in our community garden that provides a lending library full of books for neighborhood adults and children.”

The pantry’s presence makes it possible for neighbors in need to obtain food literally “around the clock.”

The powerful and uplifting pro-life film encourages people to stand up for what they know is right, particularly as it pertains to taking God's truths into society to address social issues.



The Feast of Saint John, who served as rector and builder of the historic cathedral before returning to Russia, where he was the first cleric to be martyred at the outset of the Russian Revolution, is commemorated on October 31 — the day of his death.

During the celebration, Bishop Mstislav will present a faithful reproduction of the Wonderworking Tikhvin Icon of the Mother of God to the cathedral. As is widely known, the original icon was ascribed to the hand of the Evangelist Luke and was enshrined in Jerusalem and later Constantinople before it appeared in northern Russia in the late 14th century. Enshrined in Tikhvin’s Dormition Monastery, where it remained until its closure and subsequent destruction by the Soviet authorities in the 1920s, the icon was taken to Latvia in the face of Nazi advances during World War II. In 1949, His Grace, Bishop John [Garklavs] of Riga — later Archbishop of Chicago — brought the icon with him to the US, where for many years it was enshrined in Chicago’s Holy Trinity Cathedral. After Archbishop John’s death in 1982, his adopted son, Father Sergei Garklavs, was the icon’s guardian until it was returned to the Tikhvin Monastery in 2004.

According to Archpriest John Adamcio, cathedral Dean, Bishop Mstislav will arrive at Holy Trinity Cathedral at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 29, after which an Akathistos Hymn in honor of the Tikhvin Icon will be celebrated. The Vigil will be celebrated at 4:30 p.m.

On Sunday, October 30, Metropolitan Tikhon and Bishops Paul and Mstislav will concelebrate the Divine Liturgy at 9:30 a.m. at the cathedral. A banquet will follow at Pizano’s, 2056 West Division Street, Chicago at 1:00 p.m. Donation for the banquet will be \$55.00 per person or \$100.00 per couple. A special children’s menu and pricing also will be available.

“In 2017, we will commemorate the 100th anniversary of Saint John’s martyrdom, as well as the 125th anniversary of the cathedral’s founding,” said Father John. “October’s

Hieromartyr Cyprian of Nicomedia

Commemorated on [October 2](#)

Hieromartyr Cyprian, Virgin Martyr Justina and Martyr Theocistus suffered for Christ at Nicomedia in the year 304.

St Cyprian was a pagan and a native of Antioch. From his early childhood his misguided parents dedicated him to the service of the pagan gods. From age seven until thirty, Cyprian studied at the most outstanding centers of paganism: on Mount Olympus, in the cities of Argos and Tauropolis, in the Egyptian city of Memphis, and at Babylon. Once he attained eminent wisdom in pagan philosophy and the sorcerer's craft, he was consecrated into the pagan priesthood on Mount Olympus. Having discovered great power by summoning unclean spirits, he beheld the Prince of Darkness himself, and spoke with him and received from him a host of demons in attendance.

After returning to Antioch, Cyprian was revered by the pagans as a prominent pagan priest, amazing people by his ability to cast spells, to summon pestilence and plagues, and to conjure up the dead. He brought many people to ruin, teaching them to serve demons and how to cast magic spells.

The holy virgin Justina lived in Antioch. After turning her own father and mother away from pagan error and leading them to the true faith in Christ, she dedicated herself to the Heavenly Bridegroom and spent her time in fasting and prayer. When the youth Aglaides proposed marriage to her, the saint refused, for she wished to remain a virgin. Agalides sought Cyprian's help and asked for a magic spell to charm Justina into marriage. But no matter what Cyprian tried, he could accomplish nothing, since the saint overcame all the wiles of the devil through her prayers and fasting.

Cyrian sent demons to attack the holy virgin, trying to arouse fleshly passions in her, but she dispelled them by the power of the Sign of the Cross and by fervent prayer to the Lord.

Even though one of the demonic princes and Cyprian himself, assumed various guises by the power of sorcery, they were not able to sway St Justina, who was guarded by her firm faith in Christ. All the spells dissipated, and the demons fled at the mere mention of the saint's name.

Cyprian, in a rage, sent down pestilence and plague upon Justina's family and upon all the city, but this was thwarted by her prayer. Cyprian's soul, corrupted by its domination over people and by his incantations, was shown in all the depth of his downfall, and also the abyss of nothingness of the evil that he served.

"If you take fright at even the mere shadow of the Cross and

the Name of Christ makes you tremble," said Cyprian to Satan, "then what will you do when Christ Himself stands before you?" The devil then flung himself upon the pagan priest who had begun to repudiate him, and attempted to beat and strangle him.

St Cyrian then first tested for himself the power of the Sign of the Cross and the Name of Christ, guarding himself from the fury of the enemy. Afterwards, with deep repentance he went to the local bishop Anthimus and threw all of his books into the flames. The very next day, he went into the church, and did not want to leave it, though he had not yet been baptized.

By his efforts to follow a righteous manner of life, St Cyprian discerned the great power of fervent faith in Christ, and made up for more than thirty years of service to Satan. Seven days after Baptism he was ordained reader, on the twelfth day, sub-deacon, on the thirtieth, deacon. After a year, he was ordained priest. In a short time St Cyprian was elevated to the rank of bishop.

The Hieromartyr Cyprian converted so many pagans to Christ that in his diocese there was no one left to offer sacrifice to idols, and the pagan temples fell into disuse. St Justina withdrew to a monastery and there was chosen Abbess.

During the persecution against Christians under the emperor Diocletian, Bishop Cyprian and Abbess Justina were arrested and brought to Nicomedia, where after fierce tortures they were beheaded with the sword. St Cyprian, fearful that the holy virgin's courage might falter if she saw him put to death, asked for time to pray. St Justina joyfully inclined her neck and was beheaded first.

The soldier Theocistus, seeing the guiltless sufferings of St Justina, fell at Cyprian's feet and declared himself a Christian, and was beheaded with them.

celebration will focus attention on the cathedral's historic past while serving as the opening of the anniversary year."

In related news, a newly commissioned icon of the "Synaxis of Saints of Holy Trinity Cathedral" will be blessed and enshrined in the cathedral during the weekend. The icon features six North American saints associated with the cathedral and an iconographic rendering of the late Metropolitan Leonty, who served as Bishop and Archbishop of Chicago prior to his election as Metropolitan in 1950.
